



# Waste Management Services

**Orange** offers kerbside collection services for general waste (red-lid bins), recycling (yellow-lid bins), and food and garden organics (green-lid bins). Residents can also drop off additional green waste at the Orange Waste Facility for a fee and recycle items like paper, cardboard, glass, and plastics at designated recycling stations.

**Bathurst** provides a comprehensive waste and recycling program, including kerbside collection of general waste, recyclables, and green waste. The Bathurst Waste Management Centre accepts various items, and the A-Z Waste and Recycling Guide offers detailed information on disposal options for specific materials.

**Molong**, managed by Cabonne Council, operates a Green Waste Facility where residents can drop off green waste and recyclables such as paper, cardboard, plastics, and glass bottles. The facility is open on select Sundays each month.

**Millthorpe** residents can utilize the Cabonne Council's Green Waste Facility in Molong for recycling and green waste disposal. Additionally, local drop-off points may be available for specific items; residents are encouraged to check with the council for details.

**Blayney** provides kerbside collection services for general waste and recyclables. The Blayney Waste Facility accepts green waste, recyclables, and other materials at no cost to residents.

For composting, residents can set up home composting systems or worm farms. The Department of Environment and Conservation (NSW) offers guides on easy composting and worm farming techniques.

By participating in these programs, residents contribute to reducing landfill waste and promoting environmental sustainability in the Central Tablelands region.



## NetWaste

NetWaste is a voluntary regional waste group formed in 1995 to provide collaborative approaches to waste and resource management. Covering almost 40% of the state, benefits are delivered to 25 member councils in regional NSW.

NetWaste is funded primarily through the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and delivers outcomes beyond regional service arrangements, through targeted waste management projects, education and community engagement programs, and member Council enablement.

## What Can and Can't Be Recycled



### Items that can be recycled in your yellow lid bin:

- Paper: office paper, magazines, newspapers and junk mail
- Cardboard
- Green, clear and brown glass bottles and jars
- Juice and milk cartons
- All hard plastic bottles and containers marked, but no lids please
- Steel (tin) and aluminium cans and empty aerosols

### Items that cannot be recycled:

- Plastic bags or recyclables inside plastic bags
- Takeaway coffee cups
- Disposable nappies
- Garden waste



- Polystyrene (foam)
- Bubble wrap
- Syringes or medical waste
- Dead animals
- Oils
- Ceramics, ovenware or light bulbs
